ABOUT MARTIN

Martin is a vibrant place, well-known for its natural beauty and cultural heritage. It has a cosy feel, yet with everything that big cities offer. Situated in the Turiec region, the place is also known as the Garden of Turiec. Whether you are into sports or prefer a more cultured scene, Martin has something to offer to every taste. Cinemas, theatres, galleries, shopping centres, skiing, hiking, great outdoors - it has all this and more on its doorstep.

Given the international student population and excellent public transport links to neighbouring cities, Martin is a great place for socialising and for exploring neighbouring areas.

Estimated living expenses in Martin

- Private accommodation rental starts at 350 Euros a month
- Student residence from 140 Euros a month
- Public transport (for students) 20 Euros a month
- Train travel across Slovakia free on national rail carrier for full time students (some exceptions apply)
- Monthly groceries from 130 Euros a month
- Food at the restaurants a mid-range sit-down meal for two with beverages costs around 30 Euros
- Cinema ticket starting at 6 Euros

THE TEACHING STRUCTURE

The General Medicine programme takes six years to complete and, the teaching is split into theoretical pre-clinical and clinical courses. Following the ECTS system, the Diploma awarded by JFMED is globally recognised and is a mark of quality education in medicine and science.

Theoretical disciplines (basic science)

1st and 2nd study year

- morphology and function under physiological conditions
- Biophysics, Anatomy, Histology and Embryology, Biology Physiology, Biochemistry, Immunology, First Aid, Basics in Nursing Techniques
- Summer practice in nursing

A variety of formative and summative assessments

3rd and 4th study year

- morphology and function under pathological conditions, getting first clinical skills in diagnostics and therapy
- Pathological Anatomy, Pathological Physiology, Molecular Biology, Microbiology, Neurology, Pharmacology, Radiology, Nuclear medicine, Laboratory medicine, Clinical Propaedeutic, Internal Medicine, Surgery, Dermatology, Psychology and Communications, Ethics, Public Health

Spiral-based curriculum with a focus on the application of knowledge, skills and behaviours using evidence-based medicine approaches, bedside and simulation-based teaching.


International programmes

The JFMED is engaged in a number of international exchange programmes, notably ERASMUS + and ERASMUS Enlight. Having agreements signed with over 50 institutions, the Faculty sends out its students and academics to experience learning and teaching medicine abroad every year. Equally, it receives international students, academic staff and scientists who complete their educational stays at JFMED.

Upcoming projects

Biobank and the new hospital are latest projects the Faculty is involved in. Biobank, the first in Slovakia, will be a state of the art facility for storing human biomaterials and samples for science research and diseases prevention. Joining the network of other European biobanks, the facility will reinforce the strong focus on science the Faculty is renowned for and will increase the international cooperation.

Another upcoming project is the new teaching hospital that will support the clinical teaching and provide modern medical care to public. The new hospital will be another important milestone in offering excellent healthcare and, will also play an important part in developing medical students and supporting new generations of doctors and medical professionals.
